Dear Expats,

Fall brings festivals to the region — an excuse to eat, drink and discover — choose from wine festivals (**Weinfest**) and harvest festivals (**Kerwe**, **Erntedank** or **Oktoberfest**) or try a **Besenwirtschaft**. In addition, Karlsruhe is celebrating in the middle of the month with a **City Festival** with food, music, shopping and more.

<u>Hiking</u> — in the Fall, is a wonderful family-friendly activity. Of special note is the search for chestnuts (Kastanien/Maroni/Keschde) during a hike in the Palatinate http://www.keschdeweg.de. The whole hiking route of "Keschdeweg" is 60 km long, but shorter paths are suggested on the above link — unfortunately, only in German.

The woods and vineyards in the region can be quite colorful in the Fall. The region near Trifels can be especially lovely – a trip to the <u>historical ruins</u> where Richard the Lionheart was imprisoned is worth a detour and provides a terrific vista. Another nice hiking option is the Vosges Mountains (Vogesen in German) in nearby Alsace – also nice colors and castle ruins. The Black Forest offers many opportunities to hike, ride a bike, explore or just enjoy nature. Some information in English is available <u>here</u>. During or after a hike there are places to stop and have a bite to eat — some are run by nature groups on weekends only (Naturfreundehaus) while others offer food daily (also known as Vesperstube).

Closer to home, take a walk or bike ride through the Schlossgarten, Odenwald or Hardtwald, woodsy spaces with colorful leaves all within the City of Karlsruhe.

Get out and enjoy while you can!

Fall also brings on the new season for dance, theater, opera and movies. Look below for more info:

<u>Cinema</u> in Karlsruhe — where to go to see what types of films <u>Museums in Karlsruhe</u> — listing of museums and museum highlights <u>Theater in Karlsruhe</u> — most are only of interest if you have some grasp of the German language — could be a nice challenge! <u>Books in Karlsruhe</u> — curl up with a good book when the weather is particularly unpleasant.

October and November start with public holidays. On these public holidays, all stores (including grocery stores!) as well as government offices are closed. Some museums, theaters and restaurants remain open for business.

October 3rd is German Unity Day (Tag der Deutschen Einheit).

November 1st - All-Saint's Day (Allerheiligen) - is an official public holiday in Baden-Württemberg and four other German states.

Fall holidays for Karlsruhe schools are from October 26th through November 2nd.

Remember to set your clocks back on October 27th! "Spring forward, Fall back."

HALLOWEEN for adults is celebrated mostly in the pubs, especially the Irish ones. Very few neighborhoods have "Trick or Treating" (Süsses oder Saueres), so check with your neighbors before sending your kids out. For kids ages 9 and up, the American Library hosts a Hogwarts Halloween Party on October 25th — be sure to sign up early because it is a very popular event.

WINTER TIRES

Although weatherwise the region is relatively mild, remember the "O to O" rule for winter tires. October to Easter (Ostern) is the time period when snow, sleet and ice are most likely to occur and when you should have winter or all-weather tires on your vehicle. More info here. Make an appointment to get yours changed. The first snow (if it comes at all) is always a surprise.

WHAT TO DO IN KARLSRUHE IN OCTOBER REGULAR ENGLISH-LANGUAGE EVENTS

Karlsruhe's very own **English-Speaking Meetup Group** (sponsored by expatkarlsruhe.com) is a way for anyone to organize events and activities or plan adventures. The most popular regular event is the monthly Stammtisch where you can meet nice people who speak English in a relaxed atmosphere. Start is 6:30 p.m. until around 11:30 p.m. It's a mix of young and old and all those in-between, who come and go throughout the evening. The next one is October 8th.

The <u>American Library</u> has regular events in English for kids and adults: **LitNite** (October 1 & 15), **Poetry, Please!** (October 22), **MovieTalk** (cancelled for October), **Storytime for kids 3-5** (October 9), **Teen Time** (October 11 & 25) and **Storytime for kids 6 and up** (October 11 & 25).

The **Karlsruhe Toastmasters** meet every 1st, 3rd and 5th Monday of the month from 7:15 to 9:15 p.m. to practice public speaking in English with friendly, relaxed support from speakers from around the world.
